Parents can choose to investigate one or both tabs, where they will find basic information and answers to their most common questions. If they want still more information, they will be invited to explore Scouting.org.

A bilingual (English and Spanish) postcard is available to help guide parents to this wealth of online information.

Trained Leaders

Now is the time to get all of your leaders fully trained for their position. Much of the training is now available online, so it is easier than ever before to get your leaders trained.

Leader training this year is a part of the scoring in the Journey to Excellence program, which emphasizes how important it is for you unit to have leaders knowing how to perform the duties of their position.

When all the leaders are trained, then it is easier for every leader in the unit, as the tasks are divided

between people and nobody is carrying too big a task load.

Units can get a report on their leaders training before the start of the coming Scout year. Also consider getting your new leaders trained as they sign up to help out with the unit. There is nothing that helps more with keeping a new leader involved than to provide them with training so they know what they are supposed to do and how to accomplish it.

Held on the third full weekend of October each year, this worldwide jamboree requires no travel, other than to a nearby radio amateur's ham shack.

Guide to Safe Scouting Features New Policy on Lightning Safety Measures

Statistics from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration show that lightning killed 29 people and caused at least 300 injuries to others in the United States during 2010. At least 24 of the 29 deaths were to people involved in outdoor activities. In many cases, lightning has caused serious and lifelong injuries, including memory loss, muscular pain, numbness, and depression.



To help raise awareness of the dangers of lightning, June 19–25 has been designated National Lightning Safety Awareness Week.

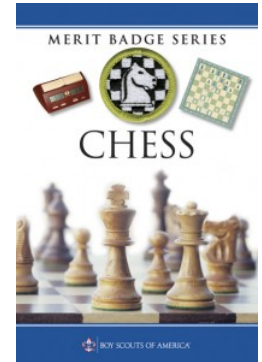

Endowment Corner:

How can life insurance be given to the Cherokee Area Council?

Regardless of your reasons for giving, a gift of life insurance can represent a substantial future gift to the BSA at relatively little cost to you. You can:

Make the Cherokee Area Council the Beneficiary of an Existing Policy: If you have a life insurance policy you no longer need, you can name the Cherokee Area Council as the beneficiary of the policy, meaning that the Council will receive the policy's death benefit after you die. While there are no current tax benefits to this approach, the value of the policy will be removed from your estate for federal estate tax purposes.

Make the Cherokee Area Council the Owner and Beneficiary of an Existing Policy: Instead of simply naming the Council as beneficiary of an existing life insurance policy, you transfer full ownership of the policy to the Council. The Council will then receive the policy's death benefit after you die. In addition to removing the value of the policy from your estate for federal estate tax purposes, this approach also provides you with current federal income tax deductions.

Help the Cherokee Area Council Purchase a New Insurance Policy on Your Life: If you wish to make a substantial future gift to a charity at a relatively low cost to you, another alternative is to consider purchasing a new life insurance policy and name the Council as the policy owner and beneficiary. You then arrange to pay the premiums through gifts to the Council. This approach provides federal income tax deductions and the policy proceeds are not included in your estate for federal estate tax purposes.

Endowment Recognition Awards

The Boy Scouts of America offers three distinct recognition awards.

The James E. West Fellowship Program

James E. West was the first Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, and he served in that position for more than three decades. The West Fellowship award is available for gifts of \$1,000 and up in cash or marketable securities to a council endowment fund. The gift must be in addition to – and not replace or diminish – the donor's annual Friends of Scouting support. Many individuals and corporations make these gifts either on behalf of someone else – such as in honor of an Eagle Scout, Silver Beaver recipient, a retirement, a special accomplishment, or anniversary – or in memory of a special individual.

The 1910 Society

Founded in 1910, the Boy Scouts of America has grown into something larger and more significant than anyone anticipated. We honor that special date by presenting the 1910 Society award to donors who make gifts of \$25,000 or more to their council endowments. These gifts can be in the form of cash, securities, land, five-year pledges, or other property suitable for a council endowment fund or easily converted to cash.

There are four levels of recognition in the 1910 Society that honor four very special individuals who shaped modern-day Scouting:

1) **Ernest Thompson Seton**, nationally known artist and naturalist, author of the first official American Scout handbook and many other books important to Scouting:

Seton Level membership: \$25,000 minimum gift

2) **Daniel Carter Beard**, first chairman of the National Court of Honor; national Scout commissioner, and author of many well-known books and stories for youth;

Beard Level membership: \$100,000 minimum gift

3) **Theodore Roosevelt**, first Chief Scout Citizen, first vice president of the BSA, and president of the United States,

Roosevelt Level membership: \$500,000 minimum gift

4) **Waite Phillips**, one of the BSA's first benefactors, and donor to the BSA of almost 130,000 acres of land in New Mexico which became Philmont Scout Ranch;

Phillips Level membership: \$1,000,000 and up

Phillips Silver Level: \$5,000,000 minimum gift

Phillips Gold Level: \$10,000,000 minimum gift

The Founders Circle

The Founders Circle, is intended to recognize *deferred* gifts designated for council endowment funds. Donors are recognized for gift commitments with a minimum value of \$100,000. Unlike the other endowment recognition awards, a donor may qualify for membership with gifts made through:

- Charitable bequests in a will or codicil
- Charitable trusts, such as unitrusts, annuity trusts, and lead trusts
- BSA Gift Annuities or BSA Pooled Income Fund gifts
- Life insurance/retirement plan designations
- Other deferred gifts approved by the local council

As with the 1910 Society, there are four levels of membership within the Founders Circle. They are:

- Bronze \$100,000 minimum gift commitment
- Silver \$250,000 minimum gift commitment
- Gold \$500,000 minimum gift commitment
- Platinum \$1,000,000 minimum gift commitment

According to the Camp Director, "The highlight had to have been the fire truck from Monkey Island. The kids loved seeing all the controls on the truck and getting sprayed."

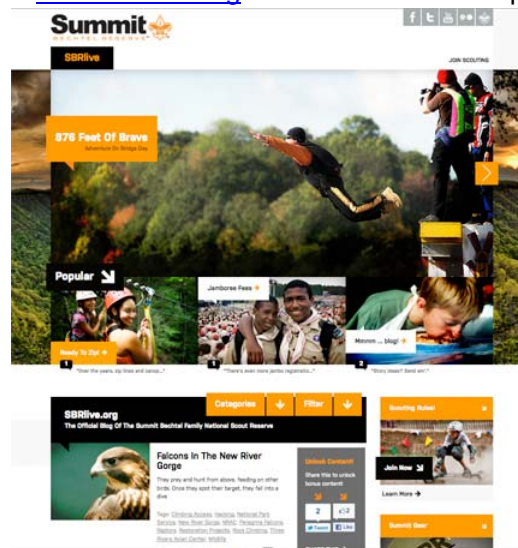

Japanese Scouts continue to rebuild communities; WSF support seen

After an extremely powerful earthquake hit the Tohoku Region on 11 March 2011, triggering several meter high tsunami waves that caused massive loss of lives and properties in areas along the Pacific coast of eastern Japan, especially in Miyagi, Iwate and Fukushima Prefectures, the Scout Association of Japan (SAJ) created the Scout Disaster Relief Centers (SDRC) where Scouts unite to bring comfort, strength and hope to affected people.

SAJ set up the SDRC in Yamagata, Miyagi and Fukushima, along with the prefectural Scout councils. In Ishinomaki City, one of the areas that had massive destruction, SAJ receives and coordinates volunteers



everyday. To have a bigger number of volunteers, SAJ provides free shuttle bus services between Tokyo and Ishinomaki on weekends. Buses

with Scouts logo and "disaster relief" banner pick up volunteers in Tokyo every Friday morning to bring them to Ishinomaki and shuttle them back in Tokyo Sunday night.

During the actual work, Scouts and volunteers are involved in removing rubble and cleaning up mud in houses and schools. As some of the shelters have no shower,

In Iwate prefecture, Scouts and volunteers are removing heaps of rubble especially in elementary schools. SAJ reported that as the ground level sank, the seawater covers the area during high tide. Due to this situation,

SAJ says that classes are disrupted and children need more support. To help ease their trauma, the younger Scouts engage the children in different kinds of activities, like making "Taiyaki," a fish shaped waffle.

SAJ is much appreciative of several National Scout Organizations that are helping in this relief operations through financial contributions.

Seeing the work of Japanese Scouts, the World Scout Foundation (WSF) looks into the possibility of assisting SAJ under the global project, Messengers of Peace (MoP). The funding from MoP



sees the role of Scouts as peace messengers by giving hope to their communities with concrete and tangible results.

Besides Japan, projects in other NSOs under MoP are foreseen. Among other projects, three are from the Asia Pacific Region that includes an integration camp between Pakistan and India Rover Scouts, a post war camp between Singhalese and Tamil scouts in selected areas of Sri Lanka, and a community health awareness project in Indonesia.
