Wilderness and Remote First Aid February 4-5

Wilderness First Aid is again coming to The Washington County Red Cross and is being taught by Venture Crew 911.

Wilderness First Aid is a 16-hour training course, which is now **required by BSA for Philmont** and recommended for all backcountry tours. It also offers enhanced content to meet OSHA's Best Practices for Workplace First Aid Training Programs.



This course includes instruction, participant interaction, and many scenarios. Participants should be at least 14 years old; knowledge of First Aid and Current CPR is a prerequisite for this class.

Cost for this Course is \$65. A 25-question test requiring an 80% or better and satisfactory completion of all skills are required for completion.

The dates for the course are: February 4th and February 5th. You must attend both classes in order to complete the course. Class will start at 08:30 am and be completed before 6:30 pm each day.

The class will be limited to the first 24 participants. Registration will end on January 30.

Attendance is limited to 300 Scouts, and everyone in the council can attend if they register prior to February 1st. After that date out-of-council registrations are permitted to fill any of the remaining open slots.

Several different optional merit badges are offered this year, along with 12 Eagle required merit badges that are sufficient to complete those needed for Eagle rank.

Free camping is available at Camp McClintock on both Friday and Saturday nights.

Adult training is also encouraged at the event, with sessions not offered online such as SM & ASM Leader Specific Training, American Heart Association First Aid and CPR/AED certification (extra cost for these two sessions), and Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO for Cub Scout leaders). Leaders also have the opportunity to learn about religious awards, how to be a Campmaster at Camp McClintock, what a commissioner does and how it helps your unit, all about Journey to Excellence and how that can help improve your unit, Leave No Trace, and the latest new things in BSA such as the new Eagle project workbook and advancement procedures that are now in place.

There are a large number of online courses can also be completed, which will bring most people in the unit to a fully trained status, which is not only important for having a quality program, but it also is one of the items on the Journey to Excellence and helps units achieve the goal of free advancements.

ENDOWMENT RECOGNITION AWARDS

The Boy Scouts of America offers three distinct recognition awards.

THE JAMES E. WEST FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

James E. West was the first Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, and he served in that position for more than three decades. The West Fellowship award is available for gifts of \$1,000 and up in cash or marketable securities to a council endowment fund. The gift must be in addition to – and not replace or diminish – the donor's annual Friends of Scouting support. Many individuals and corporations make these gifts either on behalf of someone else – such as in honor of an Eagle Scout,

Silver Beaver recipient, a retirement, a special accomplishment, or anniversary – or in memory of a special individual.

\$1,000+ Bronze Member Level \$5,000+ Silver Member Level \$10,000+ Gold Member Level

\$15,000+ Diamond Member Level

SECOND CENTURY SOCIETY

An outright gift of \$25,000 or more payable over five years, or a deferred gift of \$100,000 or more, to a local council, BSA Foundation, high-adventure base, or any BSA entity for operating, capital, or endowment

Donors making outright gifts of \$100,000 or more are designated as "Members with Distinction." Donors making deferred gifts of \$500,000 or more are designated "Legacy Members." Members in these categories receive special recognition and opportunities provided by the BSA Foundation.

PRESIDENTS LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Gifts to or through the BSA Foundation payable over five years, as part of an advised fund, designated fund, trust, or other Foundation fund structure are eligible for the Presidents Leadership Council. Gifts may be designated to benefit local councils, high-adventure facilities or other BSA entities.

JOTI Committee

The World Scout Jamboree On The Internet (JOTI) is an international Scout Meeting on the Internet which takes places every year on the third weekend of October. This is an official event of the World Organization of the Scout Movement.

During that weekend, thousands of Scouts from all over the world meet and communicate with each other over the Internet, using any technologies locally available, from web browsers to e-mail, chat programs, microphones, scanners and digital cameras.

Most of the communication takes place over E-mail and in a chat network called IRC, the Internet Relay Chat. JOTI allows you to build friendships with Scouts in other countries and to find out more about their civil and Scouting life. Often, these contacts last for years and build the base for upcoming group trips and enterprises.

Since 1996, JOTI is an official WOSM event and has a permanent place on the Web Site of the World Scout Bureau.

New e-Funding Website

The introduction of this new website offers supporters of Scouting the ability to help nurture youth development in a convenient, meaningful way.

"The e-Funding website represents a quantum leap forward—both in the way it enables people to donate to Scouting and in the way it enables councils to customize their page to provide donors with a number of options," said Assistant Chief Scout Executive Brad Farmer. Most youth members' day-to-day experiences with Scouting come through their individual packs, troops, teams, crews, and ships. These units are overseen by nearly 300 local councils, including the Cimarron Council. Initially, when an individual navigates to the new e-Funding website, the site will identify where that individual is located and will automatically populate the information for the nearest BSA local council.

In addition to supporting local council programs, visitors to http://aplacetogive.scouting.org will be able to select the "Send a Kid to Camp" option, provide funding for the James E. West Endowment, and/or support the

development of the Summit by purchasing new trees and sponsoring walkway paving stones, wooden sustainability benches, and stone benches. Other options will be introduced in the future, providing donors with a variety of ways to personalize and individualize their gifts to the Scouting program.

"Our supporters and members want to see the amazing Scouting program continue to grow and thrive in meeting the needs of today's youth," Farmer said. "One of the ways we are doing that is by expanding our reach in the digital realm and giving supporters and members more ways to connect with Scouting."

Two-fer You

Scouting's offerings expand again this year with the Search and Rescue and Kayaking merit badges.

Doug Palmer, who has spent the past 22 years coordinating searches at Philmont, says the Search and Rescue merit badge introduces Boy Scouts to the science of Search and Rescue, focusing on preparedness for searches in wilderness, urban environments, and water.

"You're actually not looking for the person so much as you're looking for clues that will lead you to the person," Palmer says. "You can't be in the woods for long without leaving some sort of evidence out there."

As for Kayaking, Pat Noack, chair of the National Aquatics Task Force, says it's the fastest-growing paddle sports in the country, and youth in particular have gravitated toward it.

Noack says the Kayaking merit badge is designed for a flat-water environment. "We'll have everything from knowledge-based components such as materials and design to basic maneuvers and the various paddle strokes. As with any of the boating or swimming merit badges, there's a strong emphasis on safety."

Find materials for both badges by summer.

Conservation Awareness Takes Hold Across the Country

What's better than completing a conservation project and earning one of the rarest awards known to Scouting? How does \$1000 in grant money to help fund the project sound?

The <u>William T. Hornaday Award</u> is presented to Scouts who complete certain requirements in addition to planning and executing a conservation project under the guidance of a Hornaday advisor. The award has different levels and is intended to advance awareness in environmental conservation. The award is also available to adult Scouters through the nomination process.

The original conservation program began in 1914 and the award was named the Wildlife Protection Medal by Dr. William T. Hornaday. He pioneered natural resource conservation and spearheaded a movement to save the American bison from extinction. After Dr. Hornaday's passing in 1937, the award was renamed in his honor and became a Boy Scouts of America award. Although the award has been around for 80 years, only about 1,100 medals have been awarded in its inception.

Those planning a Hornaday Award may also qualify to receive a \$1000 grant toward the completion of the conservation project. Boy Scouts, Venturers, and Scout

Units may submit an application to the National Environmental Education Foundation (NEEF) for consideration. If you plan to pursue the Hornaday Badge or Medal, be sure to check the Planet Connect Grant web site for 2012 application, qualifications, funding restrictions, and other information.

The amount of time and effort it takes to complete a Hornaday conservation project is comparable to that of an Eagle project. Scouts

Henry Repeating Arms: 150 Years in the Making

"Every single part in each Henry rifle is made in America, and engineered with features that other gun makers often charge twice the price for. For that reason, our

known as the gun you could "Load On Sunday and Shoot All Week Long".

The Henry .44 caliber lever-action repeating design was heavily used in the American Civil War to give a single soldier the power of a dozen of muzzle-loading muskets. The first Henry rifles were produced for army use in mid-1862 and manufacturing slowed significantly after the War. The last Henry-designed rifle is believed to have shipped in 1915.



The Imperato family has been in the gun business since 1911, and in 1973, Mr. Imperato's late father Louis, bought the firearms company of Iver Johnson and began making versions of the M1 Carbine. The Henry name was reborn when the Imperato's took a gamble and resurrected the Henry Repeater in 1996. They started manufacturing the rifles in their Brooklyn, New York factory and in September 2008, the company moved its headquarters and manufacturing operations to a much

larger, 110,000-square-foot facility in Bayonne, New Jersey.



Book Review: The Scouting Party

Set in the Progressive Era so dominated by President Theodore Roosevelt, *The Scouting Party: Pioneering*



and Preservation,
Progressivism and
Preparedness in the
Making of the Boy
Scouts of America tells
the story of the strongminded and at times
conflicting individuals –
including Roosevelt –
who shaped the Boy
Scouts of America as it
was founded a century
ago in 1910 and took
shape within a few
years.

The Scouting Party examines in particular the role of British-Canadian naturalist Ernest Thompson Seton, whose trailblazing Woodcraft Indians strongly influenced the British founder of Scouting, General Robert Baden-Powell. Seton became the intellectual mainspring of the Boy Scouts of America in its formative years. But BSA organizers preferred Baden-Powell's more conventional model to Seton's vision of a youth movement based on the culture and values of the American Indian.

Seton, well known to Americans for his best-selling book, *Wild Animals I Have Known*, and his vivid lectures on wildlife, found himself increasingly at odds with BSA management between 1910 and 1915 over issues of organizational philosophy. He also clashed frequently with Daniel C. Beard, an illustrator for Mark Twain and founder of the Sons of Daniel Boone, a rival to Seton's Indians, over precedence in the field. Seton and Beard both wrangled with BSA Executive Secretary James E. West, who arbitrated their frequent wrangles while keeping BSA solvent as the organization rapidly expanded.

The exuberant personality of U.S. senior statesman
Theodore Roosevelt looms large throughout <u>The</u>
<u>Scouting Party</u> as an influential early patron – and at
times critic – of BSA as it embraced pacifism in the initial
years of the First World War. Upon U.S. entry into the

conflict in 1917, however, BSA threw itself behind the war effort, in the process becoming a quintessential American institution.

In relating the personal interactions that shaped BSA in its early years, *The Scouting Party* also provokes reflection on the path American Scouting might have taken if it had embraced Seton's notions of harmony with nature as an important factor in the development of human potential.
